After 14 years of service, Jeff Parkinson has left the circuit court clerk's office for a new career in the private sector.

Parkinson, 40, who headed up the office's child support department for more than a decade, bid

farewell to co-workers on March 10. He has joined the firm of Insurance Link as a systems ana-

"It goes without saying that Jeff's absence will be sorely felt," said Circuit Court Clerk Richard Rooker. "He has been an asset in a number of functions relevant to the operations of this office over the years."

Parkinson, a self-employed building and remodeling specialist when he joined the clerk's staff in 1986, was first assigned to cleaning chores and

organizing the office's archives.

He drew on his carpentry skills to build shelving to accommodate files in an orderly fashion, an accomplishment that led to his being selected to design and help construct new office space for the General Sessions Civil Division in the Ben West Building.

He would later benefit from an accounting degree from David Lipscomb College when he was named the office's internal auditor with companion responsibilities of helping develop the county's first computerized child support system.

After the system successfully debuted in 1989, Parkinson became supervisor over child support collections and distribution, a position he held until his resignation. In the interim, he worked

'SEMINAR' CONCEPT WILL PROMOTE INTERACTION WITH 'STUDENTS'

Going to defensive driving class will soon become a totally different experience for the county's errant drivers who opt for education over monetary retribution.

A new concept sanctioned by the National Safety Council will be adopted this summer for drivers assigned to Metro's four-hour defensive driving classes.

Look for smaller classes and increased interaction between "students" and instructors as the course takes on more of a "seminar" type approach in teaching the evils of irresponsible driving habits.

The days of merely watching shock films and listening to endless lectures are numbered, giving way to more modern and effective methods of instilling better driving skills and preventing the need for future class attendance.

Terry Peaks, who manages Metro's traffic school program for the General Sessions Court, said the new format could be in place as early as July, provided training is completed for the 25 instructors who teach the courses.

Three of those instructors have been added only recently to accommodate the program's growing enrollment.

While the curriculum will change, Peaks said, the enrollment fee will remain at \$40 per four-hour class.

Currently, as many as 50 students attend each weekly class. Under the new format, that number will be reduced by approximately 50 percent, Peaks said, providing a more effective exchange between students, instructors and materials.

The concept also provides for role playing in mock scenarios and working out situations through small group participation.

Peaks noted that visual aids, such as film footage, would continue to be a part of the curriculum, but on a smaller scale than now. Attendees also will continue to receive handouts of instructional literature.

The new concept is already being administered in a number of other cities and soon will be adopted nationwide for uniformity.

"Everybody is converting," said Peaks. "It's a national effort to keep everything compatible and to be nationally certified in reciprocity."

In keeping with that goal, each student completing the four-hour course will receive a certificate from the National Safety Council, which recently honored the Metro driver safety program as the nation's best for the fourth straight year.

Parkinson and wife Nancy, a middle school guidance counselor at David Lipscomb, have been married 19 years. They have a son, Cory, 13.


