



Haslam Names Jeff Bivins to Supreme Court

Gov. Bill Haslam chose Criminal Appeals Court Judge Jeff Bivins to sit on the Tennessee Supreme Court, the <u>Nashville Post reports</u>.

A Kingsport native and Vanderbilt Law graduate, Bivins practiced at Nashville's Boult Cummings Conners & Berry before making his way onto the bench. He is replacing Justice William C. Koch Jr., who will retire July 15 to become dean of the Nashville School of Law.

Tennessee Small Estate Affidavit Increased to \$50,000

On April 29, Gov. Haslam signed into law the new Small Estate Affidavit, which qualifies estates that are less than \$50,000. Formerly only estates with less than \$25,000 qualified.

The Small Estate Affidavit is an abbreviated procedure that avoids the necessity of a formal probate administration and can be handled in a single court filing and appearance.

The new law increases current inheritance tax provisions for decedents' estates from \$100,000 to \$1 million for decedents dying in 2014 and \$2 million for decedents dying in 2015.

The Tennessee Supreme Court will hold a swearing in ceremony in Nashville on June 3 for those who meet the final requirements for licensing. Report Shows 42% of Tennessee Attorneys Doing Pro Bono Work

According to the Tennessee Supreme Court's Access to Justice Commission's <u>2013 Pro Bono Report</u>, approximately 42 percent of Tennessee licensed attorneys reported doing pro bono work.

These attorneys reported 672,976 total hours of service, with each attorney averaging 73.8 hours of service, well above the national average.

The report, along with the ATJ Commission Strategic Plan, provides an overview of pro bono and related civil legal services access issues in Tennessee.

House, Senate Approve Title 34 Amendment

On April 25, the House and Senate passed <u>Title 34</u>, with a two-fold amendment. The bill allows the respondent to present evidence, including testimony or evidence from a physical and psychological examiner, and confront, upon cross-examination, witnesses.

Secondly, if the court grants a protective order, the order will not deny access to information regarding fees and expenses of the conservatorship.
